Nombres de comida



Instructor Notes

Tapas activities seek to improve your students' ability to communicate in Spanish about a wide range of topics. Though you, as instructor, are encouraged to modify these materials to meet the unique needs of your classroom, below are recommendations for possible usage.

Paso 1

For this first step (**Conexiones**), your students will engage in a "pre-listening" activity, where they are making connections with similar topics in English. Help them search for the names of the four food items in both the United States and England. They should write their answers in English in the boxes provided. Then, you can expand the discussion as much as you would like using the follow-up questions. At the advanced level, you should be able to discuss in-depth the importance of names and culture. Below are the answers to food items:

1. US (French fries or fries) / England (chips)
2. US (pickle) / England (gherkin)
3. US (potato chips or chips) / England (crisps)
4. US (cookie) / England (biscuit)

You can do a simple Google search to find many more examples.

Paso 2

For the second step (**¡A escuchar!**), your students will primarily practice listening. As they watch the video, they will also see words appear on the screen, which they should write in each box according to the speaker's country of origin. At the advanced level, they should try to not only answer the questions on the page, but also understand as much as possible from the general conversations. Beyond receiving language input from native Spanish speakers, this is also a cultural exercise to recognize differences in speech (specifically words for food items) from a variety of regions.

Below are the answers for each food item:

Strawberry: España (fresa), Argentina (frutilla), Chile (frutilla), Colombia (fresa)

Avocado: Argentina (palta), Venezuela (aguacate)

Banana: Argentina (banana), Venezuela (cambur), Chile (plátano), Colombia (banano)

Pineapple: España (piña), Argentina (ananá)

Potato: España (patata), Argentina (papa)

Sausage: Chile (vienesa), Colombia (salchicha)

Beef/steak: Chile (carne), Colombia (ternera), Venezuela (ternera), España (ternera), Argentina (carne)

Pig/pork: Chile (chancho), Colombia (cerdo), Argentina (carne de cerdo), Venezuela (cochino)

Lamb: España (carne de cordero), Argentina (cordero), Chile (cordero al palo), Colombia (carne de cordero)

Rabbit: España (conejo), Argentina (conejo), Chile (carne de conejo), Colombia (conejo)

Paso 3

This final step (**Comparaciones**) helps your students further connect the video to their own opinions and perspectives. They should write down any animals that they would never eat (note: some might be vegetarian or vegan). Next, they should construct a short essay responding to the writing prompt, which they can later share with one or more classmates to make comparisons. At the advanced level, they should be trying to write and speak in paragraphs, using as much Spanish as possible.
